

Session Descriptions

MONDAY February 22 Sessions



Foreclosures and Property Enforcement—Half Day AM

Session 1

This half-day class details the economic factors, operating at different levels of intensity around the country, which have produced record numbers of vacant residential and commercial properties. The current inventory of vacant properties will increase in most communities. At the same time, decreases in sales and property tax revenues are forcing many local governments to cut services and staff. The focus of this class is explaining the factors that produce vacant properties in your community and developing appropriate local responses for effective enforcement during a period of declining resources.

Using GIS mapping and other inventorying techniques to locate and proactively enforce codes against standing water at vacant residences and buildings is likely to become a key enforcement strategy.
